Psalm 1

The Way of the Righteous and the End of the Ungodly

1 Blessed is the man Who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, Nor stands in the path of sinners. Nor sits in the seat of the scornful; 2 But his delight is in the law of the Lord, And in His law he meditates day and night. 3 He shall be like a tree Planted by the rivers of water, That brings forth its fruit in its season, Whose leaf also shall not wither; And whatever he does shall prosper. 4 The ungodly are not so, But are like the chaff which the wind drives away. 5 Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, Nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous. 6 For the Lord knows the way of the righteous, But the way of the ungodly shall perish.



1 Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To Philemon our dear friend and coworker, 2 to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow-soldier, and to the church in your house: 3 Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

4 When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God 5 because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith towards the Lord Jesus. 6 I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. 7 I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

8 For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, 9 yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love—and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. 10 I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. 11 Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. 12 I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. 13 I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; 14 but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. 15 Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for ever, 16 no longer as a slave but as more than a slave, a beloved brother—especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

17 So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. 18 If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. 19 I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. 20 Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. 21 Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

The Gospel

The holy Gospel is written in the 14^h Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke beginning at the 25th verse.

Glory be to thee, O Lord

The Cost of Discipleship

25 Now large crowds were travelling with him; and he turned and said to them, 26 'Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. 27 Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. 28 For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? 29 Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, 30 saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish." 31 Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? 32 If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. 33 So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.

Reflection

All the readings for this Sunday have the need for us to make serious choices. In Deuteronomy God, through the prophet, gives the people a choice. It could not have been spelled it out more clearly; choose life or death. This is not a multiple-choice question and God even gives the answer – choose life! However, that choice brings with it consequences. A responsibility is laid on those who choose life 'loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him.' There is to be an action to our choice. To choose the life God offers us, we are to 'love and obey'. The choice we make to choose life – is not a 'one off' we must guard, nurture and follow.

Psalm 1 describes two ways with a warning as to which we choose. Note how the progression away from God's life is gradual. As we leave the way, first we walk, then we stand, then we sit. We settle back down into 'the world'. We are now inactive in the things of God.

The Psalmist want to shake us awake. How do we wake up? Primarily by paying attention to God's word.

2 But his delight is in the law of the Lord, And in His law he meditates day and night.

Doing this has its effect – we 'water our spiritual lives' so that we are

... like a tree
Planted by the rivers of water,

That brings forth its fruit in its season, Whose leaf also shall not wither; And whatever he does shall prosper.

Paul sends back a runaway and hitherto 'useless' (the meaning of his name) slave. What does Paul want of Philemon? Onesimus, Philemon's slave had run away, perhaps he had stolen something, and somehow, he ends up with Paul who converted him. Slavery at that time was closer to medieval serfdom – duties and hard work but not without the possibility of making progress, and even owning property. The man is repentant and has changed. Paul sends him back to face his master, not just as a runaway slave but as Paul's messenger. Paul writes his appeal for generosity and mercy. Making a pun on his name he hopes that Onesimus will now be 'useful' not only to Philemon, but as he has been for Paul. Philemon and his master will both have to work at this new relationship.

Much of what is around as 'spirituality' even labelled 'Christianity' is a soft comfort blanket, not reflecting the reality of our condition before God or the necessity to choose and change.

In 'The Cost of Discipleship' the German Theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote to challenge the way he thought discipleship had become secularized and criticised a form of Christianity which he felt 'cheapened' the grace of God. If you have read it, you will know that is an uncomfortable read. For example:

"Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession...Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate."

In contrast Bonhoeffer describes the liberty and joy of grace understood as the loving gift of God which demands our all.

"costly grace confronts us as a gracious call to follow Jesus, it comes as a word of forgiveness to the broken spirit and the contrite heart. It is costly because it compels a man to submit to the yoke of Christ and follow him; it is grace because Jesus says: 'My yoke is easy and my burden is light."

In this week's gospel Jesus calls us to a type of discipleship with words which perhaps sound extreme. We are to 'hate' all others, even our own life in comparison to our commitment to him.

We must bear in mind cultural changes in the use of language. The idea of hating someone meant 'love less than' rather than 'positively loathe' and we find this language of 'overstatement' used in the Old Testament; 'loving' contrasted with 'hating', which sounds strange to us. Nonetheless, Jesus' words should cause us to examine our understanding of, and our commitment to, our own discipleship.

Thus, we are faced with a choice with eternal consequences, where will we place our allegiance? For this world only? It is a tough call. There is no 'fence' to sit on. The root of our living, the foundation on which we base all that happens to us, has to be firmly set. To take the way of Christ means we must abandon the world's values. Live as people fully engaged in life but with our eyes set beyond. This makes so much that we experience, bearable. In the world we will indeed have tribulation – Jesus told us that – but he went on "But be of good cheer for I have overcome the world."
