

The Epistle Hebrews 11 29-12.2

29 By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as on dry land; but when the Egyptians tried to do so, they were drowned. 30 By faith the walls of Jericho fell, after the army had marched around them for seven days. 31 By faith the prostitute Rahab, because she welcomed the spies, was not killed with those who were disobedient.

32 And what more shall I say? I do not have time to tell about Gideon, Barak, Samson and Jephthah, about David and Samuel and the prophets, 33 who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, and gained what was promised; who shut the mouths of lions, 34 quenched the fury of the flames, and escaped the edge of the sword; whose weakness was turned to strength; and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies. 35 Women received back their dead, raised to life again. There were others who were tortured, refusing to be released so that they might gain an even better resurrection. 36 Some faced jeers and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. 37 They were put to death by stoning; they were sawed in two; they were killed by the sword. They went about in sheepskins and goatskins, destitute, persecuted and mistreated— 38 the world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains, living in caves and in holes in the ground.

39 These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised, 40 since God had planned something better for us so that only together with us would they be made perfect.

12 Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

Jesus the Cause of Division

49 'I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled! 50 I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what stress I am under until it is completed! 51 Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! 52 From now on, five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three; 53 they will be divided:

father against son
and son against father,
mother against daughter
and daughter against mother,
mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law
and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'

Interpreting the Time

54 He also said to the crowds, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain"; and so it happens. 55 And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, "There will be scorching heat"; and it happens. 56 You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

Reflection

These are strange and uncomfortable – even disturbing readings this week. They force us to face truth and reality. It is tempting always to look for that which brings us comfort. But that is not being realistic – life is not like that. Far better we face what is.

We often need to shake ourselves awake, out of our trance. God does that through his word, through prayer when we feel, or hear, or sense an enlightenment, a flashing truth that sears into our thoughts. Or perhaps an insight into the great otherness of God before which we 'find our place' our littleness, or an insight into the mercy of God. This is not a searing which is to destroy, a fire that will burn us up, rather a fire of judgement which is also cleansing. It cannot be captured but like a comet's tail it leaves its trace to which we can return.

Demanded of us in this is a decision – a reaffirmation, a reconfirmation of our 'yes'.

In Jeremiah the prophets played with ideas and dreams of their making and origin. No doubt they bedazzled their hearers filling them with sensuous ideas which would fascinate and tun them from God. Baal worship probably seemed so much more 'exciting'. Are we not equally beguiled by the world and the media? So much easier to be carried along with another's fantasy than come to ourselves and think for ourselves.

'What has straw in common with wheat? says the Lord. Is not my word like fire, says the Lord, and like a hammer that breaks a rock in pieces? '

Straw cannot nourish us, but wheat can. God's word is indeed like a fire, or like a hammer. But not to destroy, else why would God rebuke the prophets and encourage them to return to what would heal and nourish?

Nonetheless, these readings do challenge us, especially when the writer of Hebrews sets before us a catalogue of great men and women of faith. He builds the story of their great deeds and their suffering, and you expect he would tell of an equally glorious end. But that is not what we read. These are all commended for their faith 'yet none of them received what had been promised, since God had planned something better, only together with us would they be made perfect.'

What is the 'something better' that God had planned?

We meet this in the Gospel "There is an experience through which I must pass; and now I am under tension until it is accomplished." says Jesus. The Authorised Version translates this as a 'baptism to be baptised with'. Baptise was a secular word used in the dying industry, it means to dip or submerge. But we can use it to describe a severe experience, we speak of a 'baptism of fire'.

This is the way Jesus uses it here "a terrible experience through which I must pass, and life is full of tension until I pass through it and emerge triumphantly from it." The cross was ever before his eyes.

It seems strange to describe such a thing as something better yet, of course it is. Through the death and resurrection, the long purposes of God are made perfect. Only together with us, the church, will the heroes of the past come into all that they anticipated. The faithful from the past, and us now, are to 'fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer (the one who has gone ahead) and the perfecter of faith.'

The fire that Jesus brings can refer equally to the fire of the Spirit at Pentecost empowering the church and the idea of a fire of judgement. Certainly, we cannot ignore the seriousness of his words. Do we think Jesus only came to bring peace on the earth? Is this a trance from which we must awake? Not peace but division. This quite literally so in the early church where the Romans hated Christianity because it tore families in two. Today, ever and over again we must decide where to place our loyalties. We are called to be prepared to count all things but loss for the excellence of Jesus Christ.

Jesus alludes to the way we can read the weather, as a warning to us to read the signs of the time if for no other reason that 'time's winged chariot hurries near'. There are some things we cannot afford to put off. Above all we cannot afford to delay making our peace with God.

Jesus is our peace for he has reconciled us to God in his own body on the cross. All the great heroes of faith, known and unknown, other than to God, looked to the promises of God which would be fulfilled in Jesus Christ.

As we are surrounded by this great crowd of witnesses as our encouragement let us wake up and run with perseverance the race marked out for us, 'fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. Who for the joy set before him, this joy into which we enter by faith, endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.'
