

The Epiphany

4th January 2026



In this unusual rendering of the Adoration, the Three Kings presenting their gifts are treated as caricatures and the Virgin is not idealised. The work is composed from a high viewpoint, focusing attention on the Infant Christ on his mother's lap, at the exact centre of the picture. People crowd around them and there is little sense of depth or space. The elongated figures of the Kings are characteristic of a painting style that was fashionable around this time.

A figure on the extreme right wears spectacles. His presence may indicate that those around Christ are blind to his significance; Bruegel has used spectacles on other occasions to signify in an ironic manner the inability of the subject to see the truth. Most of the figures, in fact, appear to be gently mocked by the artist.

It is uncommon for soldiers to be included in a depiction of the Adoration. As in other works by Bruegel, their presence may reflect the Spanish occupation of the Netherlands at this time. (Pieter Bruegel the Elder 1565) Text: National Gallery

A Reading from the New Testament
Ephesians 3 1-12

Paul's Ministry to the Gentiles

3.1 This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles— ² for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, ³ and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, ⁴ a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. ⁵ In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: ⁶ that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

⁷ Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. ⁸ Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹ and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; ¹⁰ so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. ¹¹ This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹² in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

The Gospel

The Holy Gospel is written in the 2nd Chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew beginning at the 1st verse. Glory be to thee O Lord

The Visit of the Wise Men

2 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³ When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵ They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

⁶ 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,
are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;
for from you shall come a ruler
who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

⁷ Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸ Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹ When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹ On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold,

frankincense, and myrrh. ¹² And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Reflection

At funeral services I always refer to the impact the deceased had on the lives of those who knew them, that they leave a legacy, a deposit in our lives which we can recognise and celebrate. Perhaps It helps to think what that might be and recognise it as such.

I acknowledge there is another side to this. We can be affected for years, if not a lifetime, by a 'legacy' that is negative, even destructive. But, gently leaving that to one side, what of the positive input others have in our lives? It need not be that we knew the person well or for a long time. Several of the people who influenced me I knew briefly and not that well, but their effect on me is disproportionate to the time I knew them.

The Very Reverend Neil Collings, late Dean of Edmundsbury Cathedral was one such person. I knew him when he was on the staff of Exeter Cathedral and was rather in awe of him. Although from humble beginnings he had developed a polished, articulate persona; no one read the scriptures in a service like Neil! He had an interest in art and would occasionally pepper his sermons with reference to a particular work.

One such occasion was Epiphany Sunday when Neil referred us to the painting by Bruegel above. My knowledge of great art was sufficient to 'cover the back of a postage stamp' as they say, but I was fascinated by the connections he made. He did not refer to the points given by the National Gallery above, apart from a comment about the spectacles, rather Neil concentrated on the central figure, the child.

The picture shows the offering of myrrh. The child recoils.

Other artists most usually picture the child asleep or reaching forward towards the gift. Bruegel had captured in this action the dreadfulness of crucifixion thirty-three years hence. Again, we must strip from the sanitised and overworked Christmas story all that which blinds us to what is really happening. Myrrh is a reference to death.

There is a rather extraordinary end to my story. Months later I visited the National Gallery for the sole purpose of finding this picture. My husband and I seemed to walk for miles from room to room without success despite following several directions, we just could not find it. We resorted to the restaurant for coffee. Looking up from my welcome cappuccino who should I see walking through the door but Neil. How unlikely is that? I immediately ambushed him, brought him coffee and told our tale. He offered to walk with us to the painting.

What struck me when rewarded by its sight, was its size, smaller than I imagined, and full of detail. The three of us stood before it for quite a while and then quietly moved away. It is a powerful thing.

In a search for faith, many people who go before us leave a trail, a legacy, which we can choose to follow as Neil did for me., "Look in other places (art) and learn with your eyes." Thus, Epiphany Sunday always brings this event and Neil to mind.

In the painting the central focus is the child, and the surroundings are contemporary to Bruegel. His characters are everyday folk, and it is geographically European. Imagine it painted now, everyone would be holding up their smart phone recording the event, which makes a remarkably interesting point.

No matter how many pictures we take, it is impossible to capture and preserve an event. The image is one dimensional despite any enhanced effects. It cannot hold the air, the space, the physical sensation. Worse, when we grab our phones, we divert our attention and lose the very thing we are trying to hold. Rather than fully engage in the unique, unrepeatable-ness of a moment we put between us and it an object through which it is filtered and detached. No matter how many times we view the image we cannot recapture what is transitory. We see but do not really see, the point Bruegel makes with the 'spectacled' man.

The word Epiphany means 'showing forth' a 'revelation' and Epiphany Sunday will usually emphasise two things. That the baby, the incarnation of God, comes to the world as a light of revelation, and that the presence of non-Jewish foreigners reveals that this child is for all the world; 'a light to lighten the gentiles' as the prophet Simeon says to Mary.

The journey of the Magi was into the unknown following distant signs and words. It was undoubtedly long and hard but the draw of finding light and truth kept them going. Their search was rewarded but that was only the beginning for both them and the child. As with all the Christian Feasts, we must not just observe but put down our camera, take off our specks and look hard. What is this saying to me? How do I respond?

We too can make this journey, stumbling often, but not giving up; we too can find the child, light and truth in the person of Jesus Christ, and for us too, that is only the beginning of a further journey and a greater story.
