A reading from the Old Testament 2 Kings 5 1-3, 7-15c

5 Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favour with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. 2 Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. 3 She said to her mistress, 'If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy.'

7 When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, 'Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me.'

8 But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, 'Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel.' 9 So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. 10 Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, 'Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean.' 11 But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, 'I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! 12 Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?' He turned and went away in a rage. 13 But his servants approached and said to him, 'Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, "Wash, and be clean"?' 14 So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

15 Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, 'Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel.

Epistle 2 Timothy 2. 8-15

2 You then, my child, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus; 2 and what you have heard from me through many witnesses entrust to faithful people who will be able to teach others as well. 3 Share in suffering like a good soldier of Christ Jesus. 4 No one serving in the army gets entangled in everyday affairs; the soldier's aim is to please the enlisting officer. 5 And in the case of an athlete, no one is crowned without competing according to the rules. 6 It is the farmer who does the work who ought to have the first share of the crops. 7 Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in all things.

8 Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, 9 for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. 10 Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. 11 The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; 12 if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; 13 if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself.

The Gospel Luke 17. 5-10

Alleluia, alleluia. Welcome with meekness the implanted word That has the power to save your souls Alleluia

The Holy Gospel is from the 17th chapter of the Gospel of Luke beginning at the 11th verse. Glory to you O Lord

11 On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. 12 As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, 13 they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' 14 When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. 15 Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. 16 He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. 17 Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? 18 Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' 19 Then he said to him, 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord Praise to you O Christ

Reflection

The most obvious action in the Gospel today is that of the one leper who comes back to thank Jesus for his healing and the most obvious point I could make is that thankfulness is a form of worship.

I suspect we often think that if our life could change, be this way or that, have this or that, then we would be thankful, happy, content. That thankfulness must depend upon circumstance. But life is not like that, we would just exchange one set of stuff for another.

There is a prayer of acceptance that views life as 'everything is as it should be, and all will be well'. It is difficult to include everything in that category. However, even here thankfulness is a key. Our circumstances may be challenging but acceptance is better than fighting what we cannot change. Thankfulness makes us realise that it could be worse. Thankfulness acknowledges something outside us, and as people of faith we believe that the God we turn to, loves us.

Actually, we find it very hard to let God love us.

Jesus promises us joy not deliverance. "In this world you will have tribulation... but be of good cheer for I have overcome the world." Joy is different from happiness. It is a deep thing and a source of strength. That being the case that what is happening to us right now is part of our faith journey and co-operation is better than resistance. Surrendering all to God allows for creative thinking and action.

The lepers acted. Their disease was truly horrid, disfiguring, grotesque, smelly, isolating a slow death and no cure. These lepers were acutely aware of their need. They gather their courage and make it into the town. Keeping their distance, they call out for Jesus' attention. What have they to lose?

Jesus does not touch them or go over to them he simply speaks, "Go and show yourselves to the priests". Well, would you believe that would work, standing there with you skin still rotten? But they turned and went, anything was worth a try. It is as they go, they find themselves healed.

The picture of the lepers (imagine it) is vivid. Their miserable state, their coming to Jesus, and importantly their *turning*. I wonder if they thought the instruction to go and show themselves to the authorities was just Jesus' way of getting rid of them. Maybe there was not much faith and belief amongst them. But it was as they *turned* and walked away that the miracle of healing happened.

This was a physical healing, but it mirrors for us a picture of the forgiveness and healing God gives us in the person of Jesus. For years we may have heard the words of forgiveness preached week in and out and still cannot apply it to ourselves. It seems too simple, too easy. Is it possible that there is forgiveness and a fresh start?

To understand the Good News of Jesus we must know the bad news, our completely lost-ness without him and his saving act on the cross. That Jesus the Christ is the only one who can do for us something as life changing as the leper's healing.

In Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress, Christian carries his great heavy burden of sin for a long time. Exhausted and worn out he comes to the foot of the cross. Only there does it roll off his shoulders and he is free, for it is the cross of Jesus that deals with sin and thereby brings us release and forgiveness.

But we can hear the words of forgiveness but not receive them. It can be difficult to let go of what troubles us. The 'burden' is lifted but we pick it up again. We have become so identified with this way of living (our great sorrow/grief/misery/bitterness) that we cannot imagine life without it.

That is a challenge, and like the lepers it begins with a turning. A purposeful belief that all that disfigures our lives is dealt with by Jesus and a new life without the burden is possible

But what of the leper who returns? Jesus says to him. "Go your way your faith has made you well." What is the difference between his healing and that of the other nine?

"Made you well . . ." this is a different word to healed. It means wholeness. Jesus says this to the man-who gave thanks before his circumstances changed - who worshipped God before he returned home – "you are well!". Jesus pronounces a complete healing, a wellness that passes all other wellness terms. This man, Jesus knew, understands. His healing was not just of his disease but of his whole self, an ongoing healing which he will experience for the rest of his life.

In God's mercy and love this is what we can hear now. 'Go your way your faith has made you well.'

We believe in one God,

the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is,

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit,

the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come.

Let us pray to the Father through his Son who suffered on the cross for the world's redemption.

Fill with your Spirit Christ's broken body, the Church ... Bless those who lead the Church with wisdom... draw your people close to you.

Look in your mercy upon the world you love.
For the natural world destroyed by our greed
For the nations in turmoil and distress
Bring healing by the wounds of Christ
to all who are weighed down by pain and injustice ...

Be present with those in prison, refugees, those trafficked for gain the deserted, orphaned, unnoticed and unwanted.

Father, in pity and mercy bring light in their darkness.

For all relief agencies we ask your protection and continued help.

Intercessions

For those known to us who suffer need, sorrow, trouble, or sickness ... We name them in your love – and leave them there believing you know and care. Help the lonely and the betrayed, the suffering and the dying.

Welcome into your presence all who have left this world in your friendship ... According to your promises, bring them with all who have ever loved you to share in all the benefits of Christ's death and resurrection.

Let us commend the world, for which Christ prays, to the mercy and protection of God.
Lord in your mercy, hear our prayers.
Amen
